# 2024's Research Breakthroughs for FeLV+ Cats

This session will provide an update from the Lifetime Study of FeLV+ Cats, now in its 7th year. The study has identified that initial FeLV diagnostic tests are highly predictive of long-term outcomes. This session will also share interim results from our ongoing study of the response of FeLV+ cats to treatment for FIP.

### About Dr. Levy

Dr. Julie Levy is Director of the Shelter Medicine Program at the University of Florida where her clinical and research interests center on the health and welfare of animals in shelters, feline infectious diseases, and humane alternatives for cat population control. Since 2017, she has followed a cohort of 130 FeLV+ cats from Austin Pets Alive!, a shelter with a specialized FeLV adoption program. This is the only study to follow FeLV+ cats for their natural lifetime. A related study is evaluating the response of FeLV+ cats to treatment for FIP.

### Improving Outcomes for FeLV+ Shelter Cats

During the pandemic, all MRFRS shelter cats were sent out to foster homes and adoption meet and greets were done via Zoom meetings between cats and adopters. Post-pandemic, we continued this adoption model for our FeLV+ cats and the difference in successful placement rates has been huge. Coupling this with a change in our testing protocols has allowed us to significantly reduce the stress

experienced by this vulnerable population, resulting in noticeable improvements to their health and a drastic reduction in the number of cats whose disease progresses while in our care awaiting adoption.

Jen has worked in animal welfare for the past 16 years and has been the Cat Care & Foster Coordinator at MRFRS for 6 years. She especially enjoys assisting the more vulnerable felines, whether it be neonates or harder to place cats.
