The Jigsaw Puzzle of Sustainable and Effective Cat Population Management

Despite the best efforts of the sector there is still a global crisis of cat overpopulation in many countries. This presentation explores the reasons why we still struggle with the numbers and how we might move forward, as a collaborative workforce, to tackle the root causes of this widespread and persistent problem. How to handle community cats needing surgery - You can do it!

How do you help a cat you can't touch? What if the cat needs an eye removed, has a bad wound or a broken leg? How do you anesthetize and recover them safely? How long do you hold them for recovery? Can they really go back outside with one eye or missing one leg? We will discuss how to safely anesthetize and recover these patients, how to minimize their stress levels while they are in the hospital and how to come up with a comprehensive pain management plan when you won't be able to handle them. We can offer excellent care to these cats and their care should never be substandard.

About Robin Post

Robin Post, RVT, started her medical career as a veterinary assistant in the shelter medicine department of the San Francisco SPCA, then assuming a supervisory role in the SFSPCA Spay/Neuter clinic. Before joining Animal Fix Clinic, Robin was Supervisor of Off-Site Spay-Neuter Services, where she coordinated MASH-style spay/neuter clinics and helped develop spay/neuter programs at municipal shelters. She is also a reserve field technician for HSVMA–RAVS.

Robin has overseen the anesthesia of literally tens of thousands of dogs and cats (from half-pound kittens to feral dogs to geriatric patients) in just about every imaginable physical condition. She received the Linda Markland Outstanding RVT of the Year Award in 2023.

Globetrotting with Neighborhood Cats

In recent years, Neighborhood Cats has been actively supporting international partners as they build their local Trap-Neuter-Return programs. In Australia, we're working with the Australian Pet Welfare Foundation on a ground-breaking research project about the impact of spay/neuter on cat intake into local pounds. In Indonesia, our partner, Let's Adopt Indonesia, is a grassroots rescue group that has succeeded in quickly spreading TNR as a new way of managing the country's extreme overpopulation of unowned street cats. The Kenya SPCA, the nation's largest animal welfare organization, has just launched a new community TNR program at its Mombasa branch with our assistance. Navigating the unique cultures of each country, as well as addressing challenges with resources, has made for a fascinating journey. Gain new perspectives on your own TNR work as we travel the world helping community cats!

Co-founder of Neighborhood Cats and current National Programs Director, Bryan is a leading advocate of TNR.
